

The **Project Report** shall provide comprehensive information using the pointers below. Audio-visual materials, user feedback, publications, media clippings, survey findings, drawings etc. should be included for reference.

PART (A) INTRODUCTION (max 1,000 words)

- 1. Briefly state the historical background of the building, site and its neighbourhood.
- 2. Describe the present social and cultural significance of the site and its relationship with the community.
- 3. Describe the current uses and functions of the building.

PART (B) BUILDING MAINTENANCE & SITE MANAGEMENT (max 2,000 words)

- 1. Explain the challenges of maintaining the good condition of the heritage property during the period of at least 10 years* after receiving the Architectural Heritage Award e.g. material wear and tear, weathering.

 *If the applicant is not the recipient of the initial Award, the building and site must be under the applicant's management minimally for the past 5 years.
- 2. Provide evidence of mitigating measures to address the above challenges e.g. regular scheduled checks, proper cleaning/repair techniques, preventive measures to address potential problems etc.
- 3. Describe innovative solutions to meet modern needs and how they relate and respond to the conserved building and / or features.
- 4. Provide evidence of sustained and appropriate investment to maintain and enhance relevance to society.

PART (C) SUSTAINED CONSERVATION EFFORTS (max 3,000 words)

- 1. Describe how key stakeholders and partners, various community sectors and the general public have been engaged for the project.
- 2. Provide details of heritage interpretation elements used to recall memory and promote the historical significance of the site to the wider public e.g. on-site storyboards, regular outreach programmes, brochures etc.
- 3. Explain how the building has been put to meaningful adaptive reuse and is suitable for the typology of the building, and appropriate and sensitive to the site and its context.
- 4. Describe how the building is made accessible to the public and show how it has a significant positive impact on the neighbourhood, community and/or industry.
- 5. Explain how the project can serve as an exemplary reference for other future projects in terms of industry practices, brand reputation and providing new economic opportunities etc.
- 6. Provide details of environmental sustainability e.g. low carbon footprint, use of natural light and ventilation, upcycling of materials etc.
- 7. Provide evidence of training for employees to equip them with unique skillset specific to heritage sector as well as deep knowledge on the heritage significance of site.
