

About the Long-Term Plan Review (LTPR)

Our long-term plans are strategic land use plans that guide Singapore's development over 50 years and beyond. They have shaped Singaporeans' urban environment and the way we live, work, learn and play over the past decades, since the first Concept Plan in 1971. We review our long-term plans every 10 years to safeguard land for a quality living environment, based on evolving trends and changing demands.

The Long-Term Plan Review (LTPR) is the latest review of Singapore's long-term plans. Beyond preparing Singapore for future trends and challenges, it presents an opportunity to involve Singaporeans to reimagine and chart Singapore's future together, to ensure that our plans are also shaped based on the people's aspirations and hopes.

Phases 1, 2 and 3: Extensive public engagement to gather ideas and feedback

The Urban Redevelopment Authority (URA) launched the public engagement for the LTPR on 17 July 2021. Through the course of a year, we reached out widely to gather ideas and feedback on how to shape a liveable environment for future generations.

Since then, we have engaged over 15,000 people from all walks of life, through a variety of platforms:

- More than 5,600 through an online poll
- More than 1,200 through in-depth workshops and facilitated discussions
- More than 7,000 through participatory segments in webinars
- About 1,200 youths through partnership with the National Youth Council (NYC)

The engagements were designed to first understand Singaporeans' hopes, aspirations and concerns for Singapore's future, to develop a collective vision and shared values for Singapore in the next 50 years and beyond.

The feedback was then translated into four outcomes for Singapore's future urban environment – a Singapore that is i) Inclusive; ii) Sustainable; iii) Adaptable & Resilient; and iv) Distinctive & Endearing; and guided discussions on possible land use strategies to achieve these outcomes.

A set of planning principles and strategies were subsequently developed based on trends and challenges Singapore faces in the future, as well as ideas and feedback collected over the course of the LTPR public engagement. In developing them, URA also considered the need to balance various trade-offs, such as the diverse feedback received from Singaporeans and stakeholders, potential implications of each strategy, as well as the wide spectrum of competing needs for our limited land. There were further discussions with Singaporeans on this set of planning principles and strategies and the considerations behind them.

Phase 4: Public exhibition for LTPR

Following the year-long public engagement, URA has exhibited the planning concepts and strategies that will guide Singapore's development over the next 50 years and beyond, URA welcomes the public to visit the exhibition and provide their feedback. We will continue to refine the concepts, strategies and proposals to ensure they stay relevant to the needs of Singaporeans and Singapore.
